# **NEAREST AND DEAREST DAY**



Your child will have brought home an invitation today to our first Nearest and Dearest Day.

Friday 18<sup>th</sup> August, 2023 8:50am – 11:00am

We invite **EACH** child to bring someone they hold dear to come and share time with them at school. This could be <u>any</u> adult.

There is no requirement to reply, however, if there is no one able to come and share the day with your child, please contact their class teacher.

The day will start in an allocated classroom at 8:50am with the roll and prayer. Please see the individual invitations for which classroom. This may not be the children's own class, as they are grouped in houses. Siblings will be allocated the same room so there is no problem if children are sharing a person.

Life is full of commitments and activity. We hope that you are able to put the busyness of life and work aside for a little while as the children share with you their favourite places and spaces at school. Following our prayer time, you are invited to wander around the school, visiting the different classrooms, the library, the playgrounds etc. The children may want to show you their favourite places and share with you what they do and where they go during a normal school day. There will be activities, play and sport equipment available for you and the children to engage in together. We hope that the weather will be fine so that you are also able to spend some time playing with the children outside.

There will be the opportunity at approximately 10:00am to have a hot drink and something to eat in the hall. The children are welcome to join you, or you can use this time to connect and catch up with others in our community or to meet people new to our school community. We envisage the event finishing by 11:00am.

## STUDENT LED CONFERENCES

Student Led Conferences help students become informed assessors of their own learning. As they prepare and conduct conferences about their learning, they are developing their knowledge and understanding of themselves as learners. They are also developing 'real life' skills in presentation, making the report process an authentic part of their learning.

Student Led Conferences support parents to become informed partners in the learning process and support them to become more able to understand how learning can be supported at home. Students will share and discuss their learning in particular areas, and comment honestly on the things they have done and identify their strengths and the progress made.

Conferences will be 15 minutes in duration (although you are welcome to stay longer if you wish) and will be held from 1:00 - 6:00pm on Wednesday 23rd August. As they are led by the students, there will be multiple families in the room at the same time.

If you have any specific concerns or enquiries, these should be addressed by teachers and parents prior to the conferences. Appointments may be made outside the conference time if needed.

The role of the parents is to let their child take the lead and direct any questions or comments to him/her. You might like to ask questions such as:

- What is it about this piece of work that shows what you have learned?
- What has been your proudest achievement so far?
- What are you going to try to get better at next?
- What support do you need to achieve your targets or goals?
- How do you manage a difficult task?

as well as providing encouragement, praise, feedback and reinforcement.

Student Led Conferences will be held on Wednesday, 23<sup>rd</sup> August for all classes except for Room 10.

School will finish at 12 noon and conferences will begin at 1.00pm. There will be no school buses running. Bookings will be available every 15 minutes.

These conferences are an opportunity for your children to share their learning with you. Your child will show you their work and you can ask your child questions and join in activities they may show you.

The children will need to come to school in their uniform to conduct the Student Led Conference.

There are four bookings available for each time slot.





# St John's School

Mānuka Class - Year 6 at St John's School worked collaboratively to create these kites. As kaitiaki of our world, we chose to use bamboo poles and recycled paper shopping bags as the basis of our kite designs. We loved the contrast of the brown paper bags against the black paper in our silhouette designs.

Each kite represents one of the stars of Matariki.

- Matariki is the star that signifies reflection, hope, our connection to the environment, and the gathering of people. Matariki is also connected to the health and wellbeing of people
- Pōhutukawa is the star associated with those that have passed on
- Waitī is represented by the freshwater awa- river flowing from the mountains
- Waitā is the moana the ocean, in particular, our Waitematā harbour, nourishing the sea life within
- Waipuna-ā-rangi is the star linked to the water cycle, the kātao water of the skies
- Tupuānuku represents the harvest we look forward to, with the kai
   - food that grows in our soil
- Tupuārangi celebrates that we are kaitiaki of our forests, including the birds and animals that live within
- Ururangi represents the power of the wind, telling the story of Tāwhirimatea.
- Hiwa-i-te-rangi is the star associated with granting our wishes, and realising our aspirations for the coming year

At this time of Matariki, we celebrate our resilient, strong community that has travelled through difficult times in recent years. We honour those who have left us, and thank God for the gifts these people have left us. We aspire to be the change that the world needs as we journey through life - te wā.
