Kia ora whānau,

Today we celebrated the Feast of the Assumption, remembering the day that St Mary, Mother of Christ and the Mother of the Church, was taken into Heaven. It was a lovely Mass and I would especially like to thank Mrs Laura Baddeley for her work organising the Mass and Mrs Cara Mountjoy for her beautiful music. I would also like to thank the teachers for their work supporting during the Mass and for preparing the children to celebrate this very special Mass for Aotearoa New Zealand.

Bishop Jean-Baptiste Pompallier was the first Catholic bishop of New Zealand. At the end of the first Mass he celebrated in Aotearoa New Zealand, on 13th January 1838, in Hokianga, he dedicated the country to Mary under the title of her Assumption. The New Zealand Catholic Bishops' Conference, in a pastoral letter in 1988 said:

"In dedicating New Zealand to Mary in her Assumption, Bishop Pompallier placed our country under the protection of Mary as she is now – alive, body and soul, rejoicing in the happiness of God's kingdom."



During the Mass we also farewelled Mr Dixon as a school family. He finishes his role as our caretaker this Friday. We wish him well as he embarks on new adventures; travelling overseas to see friends and family, spending time with his family in New Zealand and enjoying the opportunity to play more golf and spend more time in his garden.

MĀNGERE MOUNTAIN EDUCATION CENTRE

YEAR 4 TRIP TO MANGERE MOUNTAIN EDUCATION CENTRE - Written by Room 3

On Friday the 4th of August, Rooms 2 and 3 went to Māngere Mountain as we had been learning about Aotearoa history and volcanoes in Terms 1 and 2.

First, we were welcomed onto the grounds of the Māngere Mountain Education Centre with a karakia, mihi and waiata. St John's responded with a mihi and we performed our school waiata.

Next, we got ready for our walk up the mountain. Along the way, we stopped for our guides to tell us about the early history of the mountain. Māori families lived there long ago, they grew kumara, yams and taro. The mountain was a highly prized major fortified pa. They had great security for keeping their enemies away from their land. One way was to put shells on the path so the people living on the mountain would know if strangers were on their land and wanted to attack their village.

The views of the mountain and surrounding areas were beautiful and we were lucky to go on a sunny day. When we had finished our big walk we were allowed to play in the playground. That was lots of fun. Returning to the Education Centre we had lunch and then played tag in the nature area near the centre. Then our classes were split into two and we participated in two workshops: kite making and Māori games. We got to bring our kites back to school and you can see them hanging in our classrooms.

We really enjoyed the experience and would like to go again sometime in the future. Maybe we could take our parents there too.









SOCIAL ACTION - KAITIAKI GUARDIANS

Once again this year, a group of our Year 5 students are working alongside Julie from the Auckland Council to actively reduce pest plants in our local environment. They have been busy learning about noxious weeds and pest plants, locating and removing them from areas within the school grounds. One area they have been working on is the hill between the presbytery and the back court, removing agapanthus plants.

Last week, they made the most of a rainy day by talking with Julia about introduced animals and the consequences of their introduction on our native animals. With only 10 minutes of fine weather before the end of the day, they were super keen to get back out into the grounds to dig out more agapanthus.
