RELIGIOUS EDUCATION – FEAST OF ST JOSEPH



FEAST OF ST. JOSEPH A CELEBRATION OF FATHERS AND FAITH

Today we gathered as a faith community for Mass to celebrate the Feast of St Joseph.

St Joseph was a very important figure in the life of Jesus, but we know very little about him. In the Bible there are no recorded words spoken by St Joseph. Not one! But the Bible does tell us that Joseph was Mary's husband and Jesus' foster father; that he worked as a carpenter and was humble, and not wealthy, and that one of his great, great ancestors was King David (that is the same David who killed the giant Goliath with a stone).

It is in the Bible that we learn about St Joseph;

St Joseph listened to God. St Joseph listened to God's voice. He listened carefully to the angel, and because he was a kind, caring man who loved God, he did immediately what God had asked of him and married Mary.

How can we listen to God?

St Joseph looked after Jesus and Mary. Joseph and Mary had to leave their home, friends and family to keep Jesus safe from King Herod. St Joseph showed his loving care and service by sacrificing his own comfort to keep Jesus safe.

How do we show God's love to others who are frightened or lonely?

St Joseph trusted God. When Joseph and Mary presented baby Jesus at the Temple in Jerusalem, they met Simeon, a holy man. Simeon recognised Jesus as the saviour God had promised and praised God. But he also foretold the heartache Mary would feel as she watched her son, Jesus, be rejected, suffer and die on the cross. But Mary and Joseph knew that God does not want us to worry about anything. They trusted that God loves us and wants the best for us. When we follow God, we find peace, love, and joy but sometimes life can be difficult, too. Joseph and Mary relied on each other and prayed together to ask God to guide them and help them to follow His plan.

When you are anxious, who can you turn to for help?

Joseph shared his faith with Jesus. Jesus learnt about the Jewish faith and customs at home from his parents, Mary and Joseph. They celebrated the holy days together and so learned to appreciate how important they were.

What holy days do you celebrate as a family? What do you do?

Just as St Joseph protected the Holy Family when he was on earth, today in heaven he continues to care for all families, including God's worldwide family – the Church. Pope Francis has said that we can learn from St Joseph how to be caring, humble, faithful, and listen carefully to God and each other.

How can we care for ourselves, one another, and God's worldwide family?

EASTER BREAK



This year Easter falls within the school term time. School will **close for Easter on Thursday 28th March** at the normal time of 2:50pm.

The school will gather prior to the end of day bell to remember Christ's journey to the Cross with liturgy.

There will not be a bell at the end of the day, and we ask that the children leave quietly in commemoration of this time.

The Tuesday following Easter Monday is a school holiday (but not a statutory holiday), meaning schools will be closed.

The terms and holidays are usually set so that Easter occurs during the first term break and the Easter Tuesday school holiday goes unnoticed. However, in years when Easter falls particularly early, such as this year, all or some of the Easter break will be during the first term.

We will open again after Easter on Wednesday 3rd April.
