SOLAR SYSTEM PROJECT – YEAR 4

When we did our first planet, Mercury we used black ribbon and for the Sun we used gold paper. The paper was really shiny! We added a little head onto a green car as a minion on Jupiter. For Saturn, we used a pipe cleaner and sparkling tape, and Arlo painted Saturn.

World Choir Game



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Last term, one of our Year 3 students, Annabelle Z participated in the World Choir Games as part of the Cloud Singers Choir.

The World Choir Games, the biggest choral competition and festival on the globe, came to Aotearoa for the first time ever from 10 to 20 July. It was the largest choral event to be held in this country.

More than 11,000 singers from over 30 countries arrived in Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland to compete, to enjoy workshops, ceremonies and perform concerts.

This involved a lot of preparation and hard work. On the competition day they performed four songs in their 10 minute time allotment on the stage at the Auckland Town Hall. They achieved a third place in their category.

FROM THE DIOCESE

This Wednesday, 24th July the final report from the Royal Commission on Abuse in Care called *Whanaketia – through pain and trauma, from darkness to light* will be presented to Parliament.

The Commission has heard from witnesses who have described abuse in the care of many institutions. The experience of people, and the abuse that occurred in situations where we all had an expectation of people being safe, is heartbreaking. Anyone who hears of the experiences of abuse from victims and survivors – in person or through the Inquiry – knows the long-term impacts it has.

The response of the Catholic bishops and congregational leaders has been coordinated by Te Ropū Tautoko. Visit their website - <u>https://tautoko.catholic.org.nz/</u>

Church leaders have been supportive of the Inquiry and the need for it. The Church is ready to review the Commission's Final Report and consider the recommendations that arise from it. Church leaders are already implementing several initiatives and made public their position in response to themes that have arisen during the Inquiry – see <u>tautoko.catholic.org.nz/roadmap</u>.

We continue to pray for victims and survivors of abuse in Church institutions and for all those who will work to effect change. May the information outlined in the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care bring about robust and lasting change to the way church organisations protect those they minister to.
